

Rowan Core/Rowan Experience Guidelines

ROWAN CORE – All incoming first-year students (Fall '18 and beyond) are required to follow the **Rowan Core/Rowan Experience** general education model. The Rowan Core (RC) is based on 6 **literacies** that reflect contemporary priorities, while maintaining a strong liberal arts foundation.

The Communicative, Quantitative and Scientific Literacy requirements are already accounted for in the engineering curriculum. The Artistic, Global and Humanistic Literacies are satisfied by student-selected courses (3 credits required in each literacy). These are annotated as Rowan Core Electives in your curriculum guide.

ROWAN EXPERIENCE – *Rowan Experience*, which consists of Rowan Seminar (RS), Writing Intensive (WI), and Broad-Based Literature (LIT) is also required of all students. RS is fulfilled by First-Year Engineering Clinic I; and WI is fulfilled by Senior Engineering Clinic. Students must satisfy the Literature requirement. This can be fulfilled through a stand-alone literature course, or by taking a RC course that also has a literature designation.

How do I find Rowan Core Courses that fulfill specific literacies?

Use **section tally** (<u>https://banner.rowan.edu/reports/reports.pl?task=Section_Tally</u>) to search scheduled courses each term. Narrow your search by "*Attribute*" to select a specific Literacy, such as Artistic, Humanistic, or other attribute, such as Literature.

Below is a <u>sampling</u> of Rowan Core Elective courses that fulfill Artistic, Global and Humanistic Literacies. Bolded courses indicate that the course fulfills a Literature, along with the Literacy under which it is listed. Courses may vary from one semester to the next. Note: this list is subject to change as new courses are added to the Rowan Core.
